

NOTE: Many of the column hub ports are positioned close to each other. To remove cables with retention clips from the column hub, such as network cables, you might need to remove the cable from the above port so that you can press down on the retention clip of the cable.

Use these sections to gain access to the column hub.


Connect cables to the column hub starting with the bottom port and working up in the following order:

- Power connector
- Powered USB ports
- USB Type-A ports
- USB Type-C port
- Network jack

Removing the door on the Performance stand

To remove the Performance stand door, use this procedure and illustration.

- **1.** Loosen the captive screw **(1)**.
- 2. Slide the door up (2), and then remove it from the stand (3).




Removing the door on the Pro stand

To remove the Pro stand door, use this procedure and illustration.

1. Loosen the captive screw (1).


2. Lift the stand door up (2), and then remove it from the stand (3).




Installing the column hub

If your HP Engage One Pro came with the fanless hub and either the Performance stand or Pro stand, you can install the column hub into the system.


1. Remove the four screws that secure the fanless hub to the stability plate (1), and then remove the fanless hub (2). Be sure to disconnect the USB power cable connecting the fanless hub to the computer.




2. Loosen the thumbscrew that secures the stability plate to the stand (1), and then remove the stability plate (2).



3. Open the access door on the computer head unit (1), and then remove the network cable (2) and the USB power cable (3).



4. Remove the two M.5 screws that secure the computer head unit to the stand (1), and then remove the computer head unit from the stand (2).



5. Remove the cap from the stand.



6. Remove the access door.



7. Remove the long USB power cable from the stand.



8. Remove the I/O blank from the stand. Replace the access door.



9. Insert the column hub into the stand (1), and then secure it with three screws (2).




10. Connect the short USB power cable to the column hub and route it around the hook.




11. Close the stand cap.




12. Align the stand with the computer head unit (1), and then secure it with two screws (2).




13. Connect the USB power cable (1) and the network cable (2) to the computer head unit, and then close the access door (3).



14. Align the stability base with the bottom of the stand (1), and then tighten the thumbscrew (2).



- **15.** Open the access door and connect the fanless hub USB Type-C cable and the column hub 230 W AC adapter. Close the access door. See <u>Accessing and routing cables to the column hub on page 4</u>.
- 16. Align the fanless hub with the stability base (1), and then secure it with four screws (2).



17. Connect a USB Type-C cable to the fanless hub **(1)**, and secure it with the captive screw **(2)**.



4 Electrostatic discharge

Electrostatic discharge is the release of static electricity when two objects come into contact—for example, the shock you receive when you walk across the carpet and touch a metal door knob.

A discharge of static electricity from fingers or other electrostatic conductors may damage electronic components.

IMPORTANT: To prevent damage to the computer, damage to a drive, or loss of information, observe these precautions:

- If removal or installation instructions direct you to unplug the computer, first be sure that it is properly grounded.
- Keep components in their electrostatic-safe containers until you are ready to install them.
- Avoid touching pins, leads, and circuitry. Handle electronic components as little as possible.
- Use nonmagnetic tools.
- Before handling components, discharge static electricity by touching an unpainted metal surface.
- If you remove a component, place it in an electrostatic-safe container.

Standards and legislation

Countries worldwide are enacting regulations to improve access to products and services for persons with disabilities. These regulations are historically applicable to telecommunications products and services, PCs and printers with certain communications and video playback features, their associated user documentation, and their customer support.

Standards

The US Access Board created Section 508 of the Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR) standards to address access to information and communication technology (ICT) for people with physical, sensory, or cognitive disabilities.

The standards contain technical criteria specific to various types of technologies, as well as performancebased requirements which focus on functional capabilities of covered products. Specific criteria cover software applications and operating systems, web-based information and applications, computers, telecommunications products, video and multimedia, and self-contained closed products.

Mandate 376 – EN 301 549

The European Union created the EN 301 549 standard within Mandate 376 as an online toolkit for public procurement of ICT products. The standard specifies the accessibility requirements applicable to ICT products and services, with a description of the test procedures and evaluation methodology for each requirement.

Web Content Accessibility Guidelines (WCAG)

Web Content Accessibility Guidelines (WCAG) from the W3C's Web Accessibility Initiative (WAI) helps web designers and developers create sites that better meet the needs of people with disabilities or age-related limitations.

WCAG advances accessibility across the full range of web content (text, images, audio, and video) and web applications. WCAG can be precisely tested, is easy to understand and use, and allows web developers flexibility for innovation. WCAG 2.0 has also been approved as <u>ISO/IEC 40500:2012</u>.

WCAG specifically addresses barriers to accessing the web experienced by people with visual, auditory, physical, cognitive, and neurological disabilities, and by older web users with accessibility needs. WCAG 2.0 provides characteristics of accessible content:

- Perceivable (for instance, by addressing text alternatives for images, captions for audio, adaptability of
 presentation, and color contrast)
- Operable (by addressing keyboard access, color contrast, timing of input, seizure avoidance, and navigability)
- Understandable (by addressing readability, predictability, and input assistance)
- Robust (for instance, by addressing compatibility with assistive technologies)
